


JULIA BREWSTER DOUGLAS - FOUNDER OF THE EVERGREEN LIBRARY

Julia Brewster Douglas was born in Oswego County, New York, in 1852, the oldest child of a school superintendent and a school teacher. She graduated from Oswego Normal School in 1886 and taught school in and around New York City for 37 years until her retirement at age 60. Apparently not taking kindly to retirement, she went to work in the Newark, New Jersey, Free Public Library, headed by one of the most innovative librarians in the country, John Cotton Dana. After four years there, she had a bout of pneumonia, and realizing that she probably would not survive another, she came West to say "goodbye" to her family. Charles Winfred Douglas, her younger half-brother and a younger sister, Helen Douglas Seamans, lived in Evergreen. Douglas had come to Colorado 25 years earlier for his health. Here he met and married Dr. Josepha Williams. The Douglas' son, Eric, had been cared for by Mrs. Seamans, a widow and a trained nurse, until he went to school back East, but she was still living with the Douglases when their older sister came to Denver.

In 1921, the little stone building on the hill behind the Mission of the Transfiguration was built for her. The building, as well as the philosophy of library service which John Cotton Dana had introduced, was patterned after the Children's Museum in Newark. Items in the Library were used to illustrate stories or bring attention of the residents to the world outside their little community. Thus began the Doll Collection and the collection of Indian Artifacts which decorated the Evergreen Library.

Through the years, Julia Douglas served the community that had become her home, "Aunt Julia" to the children for whom she always had

time to help find a book or for a story hour, illustrated by one of the dolls in the collection. By 1935 the library contained 10,000 objects, including the Doll Collection.

Julia kept up a wide correspondence with her former colleagues at the Newark Library and with other librarians throughout the United States who knew her Library through her articles in library publications. When the American Library Association was to meet in Denver in 1935, Miss Julia was determined, in spite of her 83 years and declining health, to have them visit her library. Hundreds came and she greeted each one personally. After her death on January 15, 1936, she was eulogized in the *Library Journal*.





CIVIL WAR EXHIBIT AT HIWAN HOMESTEAD MUSEUM



On April 13, 1861, Confederate forces fired on Fort Sumter in Charleston Harbor, igniting a terrible Civil War that claimed more than 600,000 lives. On April 12, 2011, 150 years later, Hiwan Homestead Museum will open a major exhibit called "Fateful Lightning: Colorado in the Civil War, 1861-1865".

Focusing on the role Colorado played in the War, this exhibit will feature original weapons, battlefield relics, documents, letters, personal items, photos, and other memorabilia. Colorado troops served in several major battles, such as the Battle of Glorieta Pass in New Mexico and the battles around Westport, Missouri, the largest Civil War conflicts west of the Mississippi. They also played a role in the Sand Creek Massacre in 1864. The exhibit will run through November 20th, and it is sponsored by the Jefferson County Historical Society.

The Museum public hours are Tuesday through Sunday, noon to 5:00 p.m. Extended summer hours beginning June 1 to August 31 are 11:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m.



Medlen School Days

JCHS owns a one room school house built in the 1880s at its original location on South Turkey Creek, about halfway between Tiny Town and the Meyer Ranch. We acquired the property from the Homeowners Association, received a grant from the State Historic Fund and spent about four years restoring it. This beloved summer program for elementary children has been offered at the School House for over a decade. We started with one three-day session and now offer three three-day sessions. We strive to have an authentic experience of early education in a Colorado mountain school for the students.

This year the dates are June 7-9, 14-16 and 21-23. Each session is from 9 am-12 pm, and the cost is \$30.00 per child. Activities include reading McGuffey Readers, writing with pen and ink, taking part in a spelling bee, performing a part in a play, playing marbles and jacks, jumping rope, playing early games, churning ice cream and making lemonade.

Registration forms will be available at the Hiwan Homestead Museum in May and will also be distributed in the Jeffco mountain schools.
