EMAHS is delighted to announce its membership in the Evergreen Downtown Business Association, marking a collaborative effort to strengthen ties between our historical society and the local business community. This partnership opens the door to exciting future projects, including the potential development of walking tours and historical placards on downtown Evergreen buildings. Together, EMAHS and the association intend to celebrate and preserve the town's rich history, creating immersive experiences for residents and visitors. The Hiwan Accession Project, is a collaborative effort between EMAHS and JCOS. Say Hello to Shannon Stage



Shannon Stage is a Historic Preservation professional with expertise in condition assessments, managing restoration projects, and working with contractors to preserve historic buildings. She has a Master of Fine Arts degree in Historic Preservation from Savannah College of Art and Design.

Shannon has worked at Jefferson County Open Space for the past year as a Heritage Resources Specialist focused on Buildings & Structures. In this role, she conducted condition assessments of 145 JCOS heritage buildings and managed the restoration of the Hiwan Museum. She also worked closely with the JCOS Park Construction team on heritage preservation projects.

Prior to joining Jefferson County Open Space, Shannon worked for 8 years at Historic Denver, Inc. There she managed State Historical Fund grants for restoration projects across Denver, oversaw Historic Denver's facade easement program, assisted with local historic landmark designations, and worked on community preservation projects, along with community outreach and engagement. She also previously managed Historic Denver's walking tour program which included volunteer management.

With her background and expertise in historic preservation and heritage resources, as well as her experience at JCOS this past year, Shannon Stage will be an excellent addition as the Heritage Stewardship Supervisor role at Hiwan Heritage Park.
