## **CONNIE FAHNESTOCK**

Connie Fahnestock was my hero. Without her dedication and love of history, we would not be enjoying the Hiwan Museum today. When I was first a volunteer tour guide at the museum, I heard about how she was instrumental in its being the first purchase of Jefferson County Open Space. Later when I met her, I was impressed by her enthusiasm and could see how she had made that happen. Even after she had moved to Ft. Collins, she would return to assist with Mountain Rendezvous.

She and her husband Jim had moved to Evergreen in 1972 where she organized the Jefferson County Historical Society and was our first president. That was when she persuadedOpen Space to purchase Camp Neosha. Since it had been the Buchanan's home for over 30 years, she and her crew of volunteers had to furnish it with period pieces and artifacts. Her research into the history of the house was invaluable to making it authentic. The video in the Buchanan room is one piece of her handiwork. She created it with their home movies and its her voice in the narration.

Before moving to Evergreen she and her family had lived in Long Island, New York where she worked as a librarian and administrative assistant at the Conklin House Museum in Huntington, New York. She earned her Bachelor of Science degree in

Docents, history educators and Board members gathered in December to share time and cheer at our volunteer appreciation potluck brunch. These December events rounded out 2019 and essentially represent the vitality that characterizes the Society.

January 2020 ushered in the New Year with a three day closure of the Museum for a deep cleaning procedure. Many EMAHS committees began taking action with preliminary discussions regarding oral history collections, web site re-design, photo archives and the manifestation of these projects in the months and years to come. When we are once again able to gather together, these committees will continue this important work.

Sadly, many events have been cancelled in the interest of the common good and the COVID-19 pandemic health protocols. Our March presenters, Bonnie Scudder and Peg

DeStefano, postponed their appearance and lecture on Women's Suffrage. All of our vital history education programs were cancelled as were our Discovery Days Day Camp, Medlen School Days program, EMAHS Board meetings, the Hiwan book group and all museum tours. Our annual Colorado Peach Sale has been cancelled this year, not as a result of the pandemic but due to a late freeze of Western Slope fruit crops. We look forward to 2021 as being a year of reinstatement of our programs and fundraisers. ## Living Through History: Pandemic Perspectives

As we sought to grapple with changes in the face of the emerging COVID-19 pandemic this spring, one thing became clear: We live in historic times. Capturing it for those who will come after us is an important task, as lessons from the past help us to understand the present and consider the future. In this spirit, Hiwan staff began by reaching out to Evergreenarea schools.

For the Living through History: Pandemic Perspectives project, local students are creating essays, journal entries, articles, photographs and artwork to express what they are seeing, doing and feeling in these remarkable times. Hiwan

staff are compiling the entries for the EMAHS local history files at the museum so that future generations can research what life was like in 2020. The entries will also be put online so others can see them.

Local teachers have supported the project by creating assignments, and about 50 entries have been received so far. They illuminate common experiences to which many can relate. The hope is to expand the project to other Evergreenarea residents and create a bigger picture of our community during this historic era.

for its being placed on the National Register of Historic Places.

Connie retired in 1986 and was inducted into the Jefferson County Historic Commission Hall of Fame in 1987. She continued her involvement in historic preservation and living history interpretation after moving to Ft. Collins in 1989. She was a consultant for the Colorado Wyoming Association of Museums and was a member of the Poudre Landmarks Foundation Board of Directors.

When I began to develop a program for our Medlen School, she met me and we went to a one room school house and observed their program. She was very encouraging and was full of ideas.

We should always remember the impact that Connie had on Evergreen. When you drive past Hiwan Museum, think of what a unique place it is, and that it would not be there except for this amazing lady.

Journalism from Purdue University and her Master of Science degree from Long Island University. Her master's thesis was titled "Preservation of Historical Society Libraries."

In 1975 Connie was the first woman awarded "Jefferson County Person of the Year", presented by Colorado Gov. Dick Lamm.

Connie was part of the steering committee that started Mountain Rendezvous in Heritage Grove. Begun as a campaign to "Save the Grove," a piece of land adjacent to the Homestead slated for development, this fundraiser featuring mountain men, food and music, allowed for its permanent addition to Hiwan Heritage Park and continued as a popular summer event for many years.

In 1985 she wrote "From Camp Neosho to the Hiwan Homestead", which was published by JCHS. The book documented the museum's history from its origins as a mountain retreat to its current status that offers hands-on experiences to both children and adults. She was responsible

## The Book Shelf

Recently there has been considerable interest in a title that the EMAHS book store has offered for many years. The book of note, Mountain Memories—From Coffee Pot Hill to Medlen Town edited by Betty Moynihan and Helen Waters (1981), is an often overlooked book that chronicles the inter-canyon area represented as the lower Highway 285 corridor. This compilation of family recollections and primary source material is compelling in its scope and presentation. Subjects covered range from early ranches, schools and communities to characters and descendents of early settlers. Complementing the writings of the two editors are contributions from other writers with knowledge of the area history. The book is complete with many black and white photos of historic interest representative of the area. Coffee Pot Hill is located where the current Maxwell Hill Road meets South Turkey Creek Road. Helen Waters describes the name as being connected to the Maxwell House Coffee Company who, in the 1920s promoted land sales in this area. Medlen Town refers to the area surrounding the current Highway 285 and South Turkey Creek Road area near the current Medlen One-Room School. This book is a worthy read as a way to complete the study of our mountain area history. This book can be purchased from EMAHS at Hiwan Museum upon re-opening.

# MILESTONES IN THE LIFE OF EMAHS (JCHS) 1981-1986

Excerpts from the commemorative booklet printed to honor the 1998 25th Anniversary Celebration of the Society.

### 1981-1982

First sessions of Discovery Days were held.

The Society published a cookbook entitled Let's Eat Home 'n' Stead. (An apt title that would read well today).

A clay sculpture of Hiwan Homestead Museum was made to enable the addition of tours for sighted and hearing impaired guests.

#### 1983-1984

The Wilmot School gave the Society the Julia Douglas doll collection of 255 dolls. The task of researching and documenting each doll in the collection began.

The task of copying 4,500 old photographs on loan from area residents was undertaken.

The Society was nominated by Jeffco Open Space for 'Volunteer Group of the Year'. JCHS received the top award.

### 1985-1986

A replica of the woven lampshade in the dining room was made by Jicarilla Apache basket maker, Lydia Pesata.

Publication of Connie Fahnestock's book, From Camp Neosho to the Hiwan Homestead. The book remains widely read and appreciated today.

The Pioneer Workshop was remodeled to feature historic tools and print shop equipment. A printer's guild was formed.
